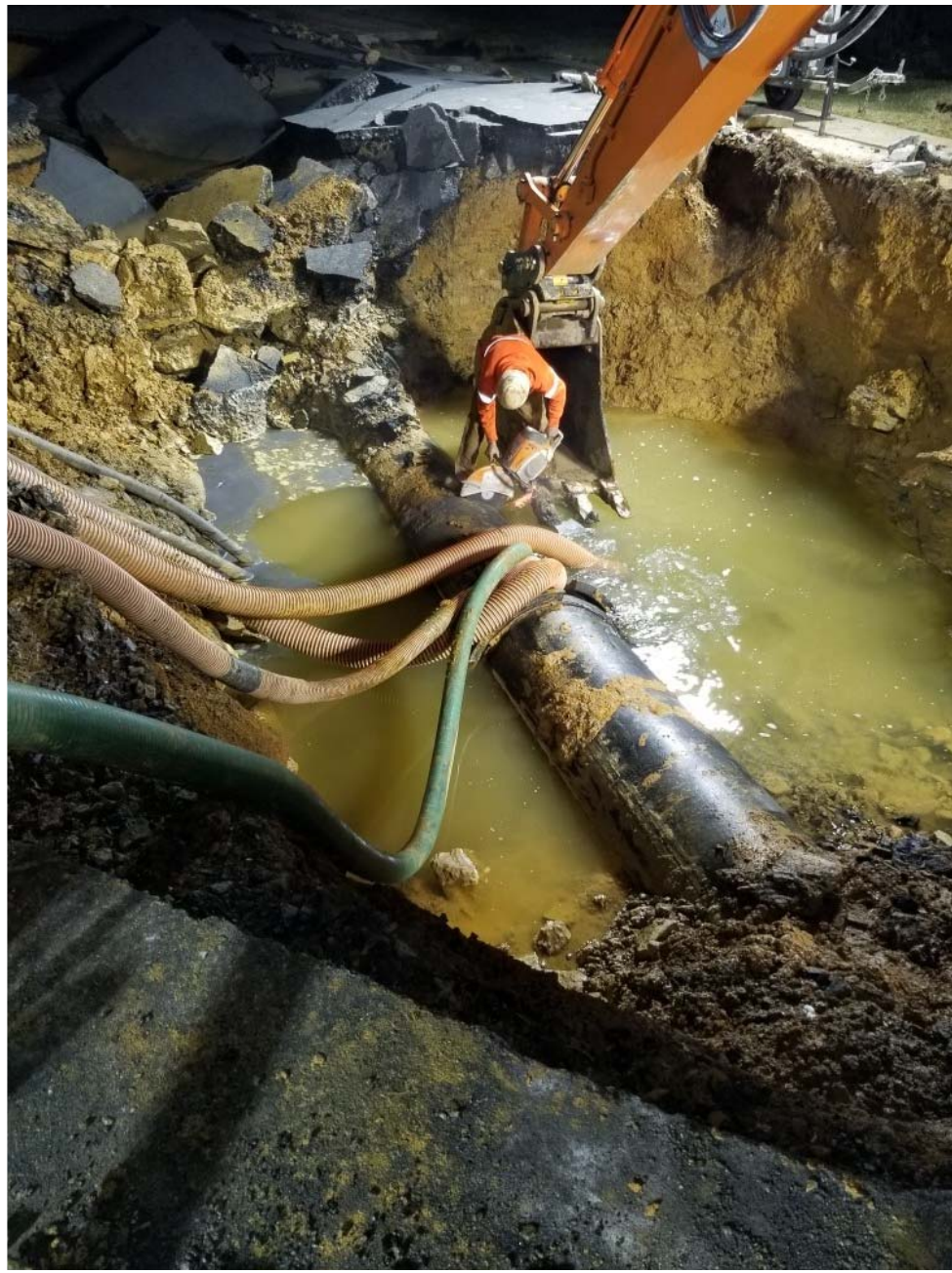

WHAT HAPPENED?

This notice follows a loss of system pressure today due to a 36" water main break in Allentown, PA on Devonshire Rd. between Mack Blvd. and 12th St., resulting in low water pressure or no water in this portion of the City. As a result of this service outage, a boil water advisory has been issued for some City of Allentown customers. ***Refer to the customer impact map.** Please follow the instructions below for boiling your water until further notice.

As a result of this service disruption, we may not be able to achieve proper disinfection of your water system, and there is an increased chance that your water may contain disease-causing organisms. We are issuing this Boil Water Advisory until 2 days of water quality tests have been completed to ensure no contamination has occurred.

WHAT SHOULD YOU DO?

Do not drink the water without boiling it first. Boiling the water will kill any bacteria that may be present in the water. Bring all water to a boil, let it boil for one minute, and let it cool before using, or use bottled water. Boiled or bottled water should be used for drinking, making ice, brushing teeth, washing dishes and food preparation until further notice.

Inadequately treated water may contain disease-causing organisms. These organisms and parasites, which can cause symptoms such as nausea, cramps, diarrhea, and other symptoms, however, are not caused only by organisms in drinking water, but also by experience any of these symptoms and they persist, you may want to seek medical advice.

People with severely compromised immune systems, infants, and some elderly may want to seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. Gen lessened the risk of infection by microbes are available from EPA's Safe Drinking Water Act (800) 426-4791.

WHAT IS LCA DOING?

- LCA crews responded and are working to repair the water main break as quickly as possible.
- This Boil Water Advisory will remain in effect until tests show no signs of coliform bacteria.
- We will notify customers on our web site at www.lehighcountyauthority.org when the advisory is lifted.

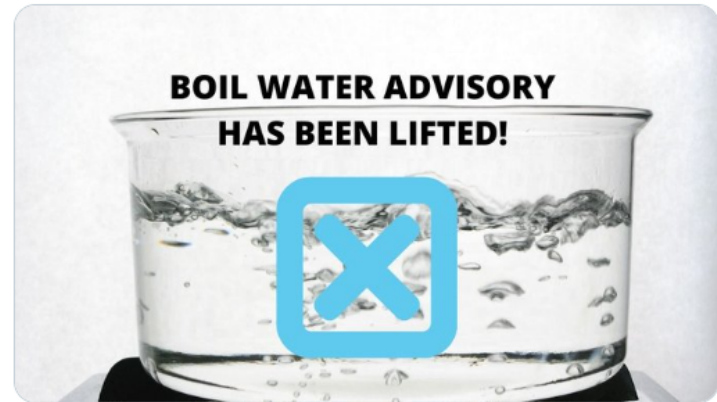


BOIL WATER ADVISORY ISSUED FOR 3,632 CUSTOMERS IN SOUTH SIDE ALLENTOWN

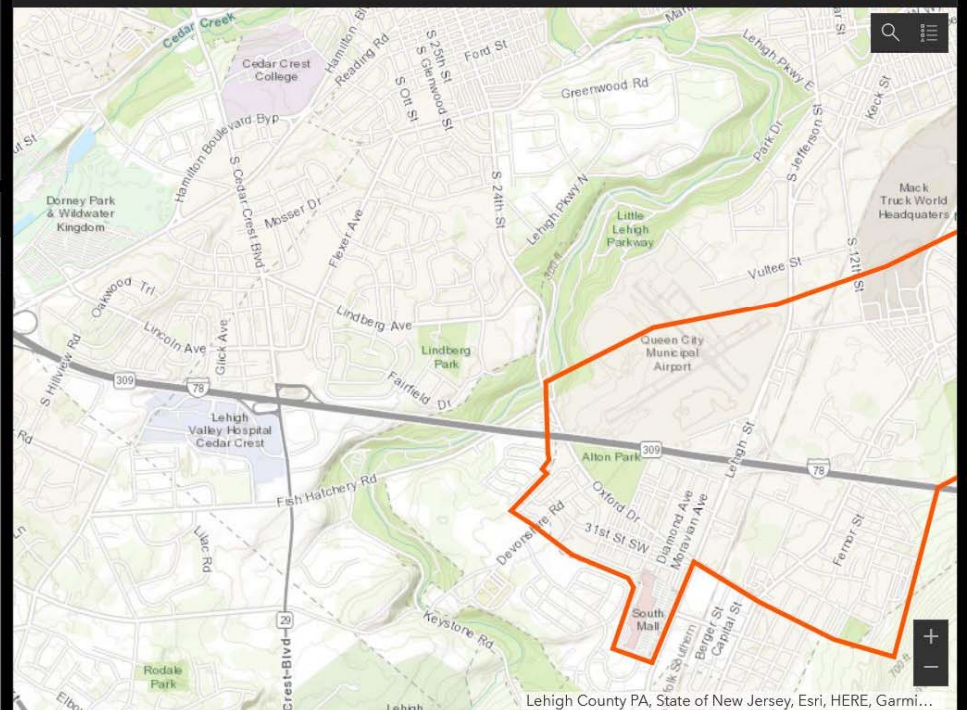
